

Priorities

Healthcare

Recognize that healthcare is a human right. Advance legislation that funds healthcare for all.

Education

Providing equal access to highquality education focuses on providing public education, including adequate funding, wellqualified teachers, modern buildings, effective leadership, and comprehensive curriculums.

Criminal Justice Reform

End harsh policies and racial inequities at every point in the criminal justice system that intervenes in the lives of Tennesseans.

Policing

Focus on improving public safety by ensuring historically marginalized communities have the resources to address critical social problems, such as access to housing, food security, transportation, and physical and mental healthcare, while minimizing reliance on enforcement and reducing the harms that often accompany policing—such as uses of force and arrests.



Civic Engagement

Expanding voting rights, increasing the opportunity to vote, and promoting timely and meaningful citizen and stakeholder involvement in civic priority setting, decision-making, program development, and service delivery, decriminalizing protesting and protecting constitutional rights, and supporting local control.

• Everyone has fair and just opportunity to attain their highest level of health; Incréasing opportunities for everyone to live the healthiest life possible


Social Drivers of Health (SDOH)

TN has **2nd highest rural hospital closure rate** in the nation, as well as the highest per capita rate













Health Factors and Health Outcomes Comparison





Social Determinants and Health Equity

- SDOH are key drivers in the health of the patients and communities
- SDOH influence the disparities observed in rates of morbidity and mortality, especially for vulnerable populations
- SDOH impact differences seen in:
 - quality of care received
 - access to health care
 - including preventive and treatment services
 - life opportunities, exposures, and stresses






Poverty by County and by Race/Ethnicity





Percent in Poverty








Nutritionally Insecure Households with Children








Workforce Development & Health Equity Strategy Community Health Workers

- Example: Community-Based Organization Patient Success Encounter
 - Patient was assessed for SDOH/COVID-19 vaccination status.
 - During encounter, patient was in pain, but CHW could tell something else was going on as the patient looked worried.
 - Patient at first seemed to not want to speak due to their pain, but once CHW approached the patient with positivity and thoroughly discussed programs/services, patient was happy to hear and proceeded to do SDOH survey.
 - During the SDOH survey, as patient and CHW were discussing their situation, it made sense why the patient looked worried as the patient had a total of 10 SDOHs:
 - In the future, bug instabilities- Afraid of losing housing in the future, bug infestation, mold, inadequate heat, oven or stove not working, & no smoke detectors/smoke detectors not working.
 - Both food insecurities
 - Transportation needs
 - Utility needs
 - CHW identified where assistance could be provided for the patient and referred the patient to the appropriate resources.



What do we do now?

- Partner with communities
- Provide referrals
- Establish health ministries








Grant Categories



Equipment Access

Programs that offer access to computer labs and technology equipment such as computers, software, tablets and assistive technology that support digital skills.



Training that connects underserved populations to basic/entry-level digital literacy and skills.

Digital Navigation

Programs that provide support to underserved communities with a <u>primary</u> focus on solving issues related to home connectivity. Skill building and device access can be included as wrap-around services.

Project Examples

Equipment Access

A workforce opportunity center is equipped with mobile tech labs expanding the current capacity for digital literacy training and accessibility. Clients will be offered basic computer classes and job training and have open access to computer labs.

Basic Literacy Training

A neighborhood action center connects youth, families and senior citizens to community-based digital literacy training. Goals include basic digital literacy and ongoing trainings on internet safety, PC programs and more.

Digital Navigation

A community-based organization assists residents with Internet adoption, the use of computing devices, securing broadband service and learning basic literacy skills.


